Nance, Nelson T.-- Convicted on May 15, 1923, in the hustings court of Richmond, of grand larceny, and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on June 30, 1923, upon the recommendation of the trial judge, Commonwealth's attorney, commissioner of the State board of public welfare, police officers who arrested these boys and numerous citizens.

Napier, A. L.-- Convicted in August, 1922, in the circuit court of Wise County, of participating in the lynching of a negro, and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on October 6, 1923, the judge and Commonwealth's attorney stating they do not wish to interpose any objection to clemency, this man having served over half his time, working without a guard and making a splendid prisoner, and the Superintendent of the Penitentiary advising that he would be glad to see him get some reward for his faithful service, and upon the recommendation of many reliable citizens from his county.

Nicholas, Mike-- Convicted in January, 1922, in the corporation court of Danville, of attempted rape, and sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on August 17, 1923, upon the recommendation of the judge and Commonwealth's attorney, this man having served over half his time with a clean, clear record.

Nichols, Floyd-- Convicted in January, 1911, in the corporation court of Roanoke, of house breaking, and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary, plus eleven years, one month and twenty-five days remainder of his first sentence, plus five years for second conviction. Granted conditional pardon on December 13, 1922, upon the recommendation of the present judge of the court, prosecuting attorneys stating they have no objection, in view of the change in the statute with regard to the time given for second conviction and this man's service of his time with the exception of about two years with a pretty good record.

Tate, Shaler B.-- Convicted in August, 1921, in the circuit court of Wise County, of participating in the lynching of a negro, and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on October 6, 1923, upon the recommendation of the trial judge and Commonwealth's attorney, this man having served half his time and made a splendid prisoner working at the State Game Farm without a guard.

Taylor, Edna-- Convicted in January, 1922, in the hustings court of the city of Richmond, of house breaking and larceny, and sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on July 24, 1923, upon the recommendation of the trial judge and Commonwealth's attorney and in view of her good prison record.

Taylor, Thomas-- Convicted in November, 1915, in the hustings court of the city of Richmond, of attempt to murder and malicious wounding, and sentenced to twelve years in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on May 28, 1923, upon the recommendation of the judge and Commissioner of the state board of public welfare (prosecuting attorney in this case not being living), the prisoner having served over seven years with not a mark against his record.

Terry, Tom-- Convicted in April, 1917, in hustings court part two of the city of Richmond, of rape, and sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on August 25, 1922, upon the recommendation of the judge and Commonwealth's attorney, and the approval of the husband, mother and other members of the family of the woman involved, prisoner having served over half his time with a good record.

Thomas, George R.-- Convicted in October, 1921, in the corporation court of Lynchburg, of grand larceny, and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. Granted conditional pardon on April 30, 1922, upon the recommendation of the judge, Common-
